HONORING TODD HOWLAND

Representative of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights for Colombia – with over 25 years of professional experience in the field of human rights, he also held other human rights positions with the United Nations, NGOs and academic institutions in a number of countries, including the US, Rwanda, Equatorial Guinea, Switzerland, Ethiopia and Korea. He has authored numerous scholarly articles on

human rights in **publications** such as the *Human Rights Quarterly*, the *Denver Journal of International Law and Policy* and the *Virginia Journal of International Law*. He has published extensively on human rights in newspapers and magazines including, the *Washington Post*, *Los Angeles Times*, *Boston Globe*, the *Toronto Globe* and *Mail and Revista Semana*.

Howland was director of the Robert F. Kennedy Center for Human Rights in Washington, DC. He has also worked at El Rescate, the European Commission and in Ethiopia for the Carter Center. Howland was a professor of human rights law at Hankuk University in Seoul, South Korea. He holds a JD and MA from the University of Denver and was a Visiting Fellow at the Harvard Human Rights Program.
