

Bipartisan Group of Senators Look to Gain Permanent Reauthorization of the Land and Water Conservation Fund

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- U.S. Senators Cory Gardner (R-CO), Richard Burr (R-NC), Michael Bennet (D-CO), and others today introduced legislation to permanently reauthorize the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), which would fully realize LWCF's promise to conserve parks, open spaces, and wildlife habitat for the benefit of hunting, fishing, and outdoor recreation. Sens. Susan Collins (R-ME), Steve Daines (R-MT), and Martin Heinrich (D-NM) also cosponsored the legislation.

"LWCF is essential to protect Colorado's natural treasures and I have long supported a permanent reauthorization of this program," **said Senator Gardner.** "This bipartisan, commonsense legislation is supported by countless Coloradans and Americans who want to protect our country's public lands for future generations to enjoy. I'll continue to work with my colleagues to see permanent reauthorization of LWCF signed into law."



According to 2018 Conservation in the West Poll, 76% of Westerners identify as conservationists








SURVEY DATA

According to 2017 Conservation in the West Poll, 80% of Westerners believed national monument protections should be kept in place by the incoming administration









According to the 2018 Conservation in the West Poll, Westerners overwhelmingly attribute positive attributes to national monuments—and reject negative ones.



RAPID RESPONSE

CWP analyzed a random sample of public comments shortly before the comment period closed.

98 percent of those comments expressed support for keeping or expanding national monument designations.

There is little question that the reduction of these monuments goes against the will of the people. Over 2.7 million public comments were submitted by Americans during the Interior's 60-day comment period. Over **98 percent** of those comments expressed support for protecting, maintaining or expanding national monuments.




"These visitors happen to be the American people," Hannagan said. "What do you want? Do you want to improve the local economy and jobs, or not?"

The review drew more than 2.7 million public comments, **98 percent** of which supported the national monuments, according to an analysis by the Center for Western Priorities.




According to an analysis conducted by the center, more than 98 percent of the roughly 1.4 million public comments submitted as part of the administration's review came from people who favor keeping the monuments as they are. "So it should be an easy call for Secretary Zinke," Prentice-Dunn said




Our national monuments need your help.


